




# 2020 Proposition/Measure Voting Guide

<p><b>Proposition 14</b></p> <p>Authorizes the issuance of \$5.5 billion in general obligation bonds to fund the CA institute of Regenerative Medicine created in 2004. Cost to repay bonds will be about \$7.8billion over 30 years. Beginning in 2026 the bond repayment would come from the state general fund.</p>	<p><b>Proposition 15: Opposed by C.A.R.</b></p>  <p>Amends Proposition 13 creating a Split-Roll for taxation. Will increase property taxes by \$11.5B annually. Hurts small businesses and will drive up the already high cost of living in CA.</p>	<p><b>Proposition 16</b></p> <p>Will overturn the equal rights achieved under Prop. 209, passed in 1996, which prohibits state and local governments from discriminating against or granting preferential treatment to individuals or groups on the basis of race, sex, color, ethnicity or national origin. Proposition 16 Repeals Prop 209.</p>
<p><b>Proposition 17</b></p> <p>Will grant the right to vote to individuals who have completed their state or federal prison term, prior to completing their parole requirements.</p>	<p><b>Proposition 18</b></p> <p>Will allow 17 year-olds who will be 18 by the time of the next general election to vote in any primary or special election that occurs before the next general election.</p>	<p><b>Proposition 19: Supported by C.A.R.</b></p>  <p>C.A.R. is sponsoring Prop. 19 which Limits Taxes on Seniors, Severely Disabled Homeowners, and Wildfire Victims; Closes unfair tax loopholes used by wealthy out-of-state investors; and protects Prop. 13 savings.</p>
<p><b>Proposition 20</b></p> <p>Restricts parole for certain offenses; authorizes felony sentences for certain offenses currently treated as misdemeanors. People who commit certain theft-related crimes such as repeated shop lifting could receive increased penalties.</p>	<p><b>Proposition 21: Opposed by C.A.R.</b></p>  <p>Expands local governments' authority to enact rent control on residential property over 15 years old. Would repeal most if not all provisions of Costa Hawkins. Allows local governments to be more restrictive than state law on rent control.</p>	<p><b>Proposition 22</b></p> <p>Classifies "app based" drivers as independent contractors instead of as employees. Allows "app-based" workers to join others, such as REALTORS® ,who are exempt from provisions of AB 5 and are allowed to work as independent contractors in CA.</p>
<p><b>Proposition 23</b></p> <p>Establishes state requirements for Kidney Dialysis Clinics. Requires a doctor to be on site during all patient treatment hours.</p>	<p><b>Proposition 24</b></p> <p>Expands consumer privacy laws and creates a new state agency responsible for the oversight of and along with the Department of Justice, enforcing, state consumer privacy laws.</p>	<p><b>Proposition 25</b></p> <p>A "yes" vote is to <u>uphold</u> the contested legislation, Senate Bill 10 (SB 10), which would replace cash bail with risk assessments for detained suspects awaiting trials. A "no" vote is to <u>repeal</u> the contested legislation, Senate Bill 10 (SB 10), thus keeping in place the use of cash bail for detained suspects awaiting trials.</p>
